

Bicentenary Reflection at Marienburg on 26th June 2022

Searching for the Source

At the significant occasion of Bicentenary of the Society of JMJ, we have come from many places to be in Mariënburg today, most loved, almost a holy place for us. We have come together from Ghana, Rome, Heeswijk, Boxtel, and India, to remember that we have been on the way for 200 years. Our sisters from Indonesia could not join us. We miss them at this important event.

The beginning of JMJ was small and not everything pleasant. We have experienced high and low points, disappointment and joy. And today, we are here to remember how it all began. And specially to think about the place where we now stand.

In the Book of Exodus, we read that Moses, deep in the wilderness, was shepherding the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law. It was there that the *Living God* appears to him in the middle of a *burning bush* which is all ablaze, and yet is not consumed. Moses, familiar with the wilderness, and yet amazed by this strange phenomenon, very cautiously approaches the bush.

When God sees him getting closer, He calls out to him: 'Moses, Moses, do not come any closer. Take off your sandals, because the place on which you are standing is holy ground' (Ex: 3.4).

Moses covers his face, because he does not dare to look up to God.

And then he hears what is expected of him. And by means of nothing other than the name of God - 'I am here, I will be with you' - etched into his soul, then Moses goes on his way. It seems that there are no holy

places by a burning bush, in the wilderness or on the top of a mountain, where in a draught of wind, God passed by Elijah.

And this is also how it was with Jesus. He is born somewhere in Bethlehem, lives for some time as a refugee in Egypt, returns to Nazareth with his parents and goes regularly on pilgrimage to Jerusalem. He appears in synagogues, by the Lake of Galilee, on a mountain, with people at home or somewhere on the way. He has no fixed abode, has no preference for holy places, but feels at home in all places. He urges his followers not to visit the temple or the synagogue, but to fulfil the will of the Father. Whether or not you hold fast to the mountain in Samaria or to the temple in Jerusalem, Jesus says to the woman at the well: It is not about a holy place, it is about people, who in spirit and truth search for the Father (John 4: 20-24).


It is not about clinging or longing to return to places, times and rituals, that we once experienced as holy and good. It is about the place where we now stand, live, dwell and work being experienced as holy ground. And yet, as modern pilgrims, we come from far and wide to Europe so that we can visit the places where it once began: Ghent, Namur, Amersfoort, Culemborg, Engelen. Are these holy places? Can these places be holy ground?

In 1819, shortly after he began working in Culemborg as an assistant priest, Father Wolff sent three candidates to the Soeurs de Notre Dame in Ghent (Belgium), to be formed there for the religious life. Later on, four other candidates followed. By 1822, the plans to found













a religious institute became concrete because a number of young women from Utrecht had also come forward to enter the religious life.

In 1823 the Regalement (a sort of Constitution) had been approved by the Archpriests of Holland, and on the 29 July of that same year, the first house in the Muurhuizen in Amersfoort was rented. It is there, in that place, that the first community begins, with two sisters who had undergone their first formation in religious life in Belgium, and three young women whose spiritual formation had taken place in Utrecht, led by a parish priest.

The community began under the name Pédagogie Chrétienne. It was from Amersfoort that the institute extended into the south of the Netherlands, namely to Engelen, Nijmegen and Zevenbergen. Because of problems within and outside of the community in Amersfoort, a separation took place after twenty years between Amersfoort and the three communities around Engelen. At that time the Congregation had twelve sisters.

Engelen became the Motherhouse, but only for a short time. Its isolated location and the many problems with flooding meant that the Motherhouse was relocated to Postelstraat in Den Bosch. However, it did not take long before this house became too small. It was the Motherhouse of a rapidly growing institute. It was providing training for teachers, the novitiate was there, and 750 children came every day to school.

In 1896, when the Motherhouse had existed for 25 years, the decision was made to purchase ground on the Westwal, which today is known as the St. Janssingel. A convent of the Franciscan Sisters, called 'Mariënburg', had once stood on that same place for two centuries, where one hundred sisters had lived a contemplative life.

When in 1629 Frederik Hendrik occupied the city, it was then governed by Protestants. The property and goods of the convent were confiscated and the sisters were forced to flee. The convent was destroyed and was sold a number of times, and in 1896 it became the property of JMJ. The construction was done with real zest and zeal! On 31 December 1898 the clock was set into the tower. On 16 November 1899 the board members held their first board meeting there.

After 115 years we had to part with what was built with so much care and love. On 29 July 1897, Sister Seraphine Pullens laid the first stone, and now in 2014, the Provincial Council of the Netherlands had to sell Mariënburg. The cloister between the Dommel and Dieze exists no more.

Holy places: Amersfoort, Culemborg, Engelen, Postelstraat and Mariënburg: they exist no more. There is almost nothing left to remind us of those early days. Just like the burning bush of Moses, and the mountain on which Elijah felt the Eternal One passing by, they have not become sites of pilgrimage. And yet, we go on pilgrimage: we search for our 'roots'. But what are we searching for in these places? It is interesting to discover that you will find nothing.

But where do our roots lie? How do we get closer to our sources?

It took a long time before we became interested in our own history, because we were fully occupied with responding to the demands of the time.

However, the real question here is: are the active congregations only concerned with an external spirituality: doing good to those who find themselves in a difficult situation?

If this is the case, then 'mercy', benevolence, doing good, would correspond with providing education to

poor children, caring for those who are terminally ill, giving a home to orphans etc. However, when it comes to mercy this does not mean giving from out my own abundance to another who has less or nothing. That would mean turning the other into an object of my love, of me doing good.

When it comes to mercy, it is not the 'I' who stands at the centre, but the other who looks at me, asks me for help, calls me to account. In the eyes of the other, the Other looks at me, touches me to the very depths of my soul. This is about a way of looking, of listening and feeling, that draws me out of myself.

During the last decades a gap has come to light between the religious institutes and the religious experience of the source which lies at the very foundation of these institutes: the non-rational explanation 'of God's working' in people, which on its own initiative introduces a new religious way of life. And yet, an attentive reading shows clearly that the sisters are being invited, over and over again, not to walk their own way, but to walk the way of God.

Some years ago the book written by Sister Seraphine Gommers, 'En het zaadgroeide op', the 'Seed Grows Up' was thought more than sufficient. However, on 15 July 1997, during the celebrations to mark the 175-year foundation of the Congregation, the first copy of 'De Geest die ons beweegt' (Sent by the Lord)

consisting of Founder's writings was solemnly presented to the Provincial Superiors in the Mariënburg chapel. It was on that occasion that the Superior General, Sister Benedict Melchers said:

'We hope that in reading and talking together about these texts we will be encouraged to continue walking in faith, on the way that lies before us.'

Our calling was and is about unpretentiously doing good, about helping where no one helps. This is in the spirit of the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus says: 'Do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your charity happens in secret, and your Father, who sees in secret, will reward you' (Matt:6.3-4). It is not about doing many and great things, or about making a display of goodness.

Everything passes: all those memorable moments, holy places, even the place where we now stand: Mariënburg, where for more than 115 years we have lived, worked and prayed.

We do not know where the Spirit will drive us, but we trust that along the way we will reach our destination.

Or, in the words of Father Wolff: 'Just like the apostles of former times, so we are sent out to provide education to poor children, to apply ourselves to mercy. It is important that we treat each other with respect, that we dedicate ourselves to the work that God asks of us.'

- Quiz on Constitutions: To deepen the knowledge on Constitutions, the BCC of Bangalore Province conducted quiz for 10 months on the Constitutions and Spirit & Charism. 215 sisters participated in the 10 months' quiz with much enthusiasm and lively spirit.
- Remembering the dear departed members: A special day was dedicated to the memory of all the dear departed JMJ Sisters. In all our communities' sisters offered holy masses, prayed special rosaries, organized prayer services and visited the cemeteries remembering our sisters with nostalgia for the great example of self-sacrifice and dedication they set before us to imbibe.
- Felicitating the Senior Sisters: It was indeed a noble gesture of our Province Leaders to honour our senior most sisters above eighty years of age. They were congratulated and falicitated for their valuable and exemplary lives as true daughters of the Founder.

A Clarion Call to Harken to the Cry of Creation

The session on Justice Peace and Integrity of Creation has brought to us rich spirituality of JPIC i.e., God cares and seeks the wellbeing of the poor. It talks about the care for the environment and all that is within the environment and that God Himself is involved in and committed to the task of making the world a place that is just and reconciled, providing a dignified life to all His creatures.

The book of Genesis states, "God saw all He had made and indeed it was very good!" (Gen 1:31). JPIC seeks to draw our attention to the fact that, the whole of creation that is originated from God is respectable and deserves justice and peace. In doing this we should uphold all creatures as having equal right and dignity.

JPIC has been promoted in the Church right from the beginning of the Church on various ways. The Second Vatican Council which was convened by Saint John XXIII in 1962 and concluded by Pope Paul VI in 1965 aims at bridging the gap between the rich and the poor. It seeks to promote justice for all. The document *Gaudium et Spes*, the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World reads,

"Taking into account the immensity of the hardship which still afflict a large section of humanity and with a view of fostering everywhere the justice and love of Christ for the poor the Council suggested to create some organization whose task would be to arouse the Catholic community to promote and foster Social Justice between nations" (GS 90). It seeks to promote justice and peace as well as the care of creation.

The Catholic Social Teaching (CST) also stresses on the dignity of work, the right of workers and option of the poor and the vulnerable. In the recent document "Laudato Si' Care for Our Common Home" Pope Francis raises concern on how to combat the destruction on the environment through human activities and suggest ways to protect it for future generations. Another concern is the inequality in the world where the poor and the weak of the society have no say on the mismanagement of resources and the environment by the rich. He calls on us to develop a new lifestyle where the entire world community works to solve the complex issue we face today.

We were also taken through the history of JPIC in the Society of Jesus Mary Joseph, JPIC – JMJ Charism and Spirituality and JMJ response to JPIC. The seminar has really enriched us on the part we have to play in promoting Justice Peace and Integrity of Creation in our communities and the society in which we find ourselves. The Sessions stirred in us a deep sense of responsibility to put into action, in small or big way, to promote the wellbeing to not only human community but to entire creation.

We thank Sr. Vijaya Mary Udumala, the General Councillor and Sr. Denin Mary Chiriyankandath, the Mission Coordinator for the Congregation for enabling us to draw out the action plan which will keep us building a bond with the Humanity and the Mother Earth.



Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission

Pope Francis has invited for an year long preparation on Synodality to discern ways in the decision making of the whole Church in which we are also part of this process. The Church is inviting us to come in communion and participate in the mission as to the signs of the times.

For a Synodal Church – the three dimensions of Communion, Participation and Mission are profoundly inter-related. They are the vital pillars of the Synodal Church.

Synodal Church: The Holy Spirit is leading the Church to move forward as we are seeking the Will of God in the Church. This initiative is part of a global consultation process led by Pope Francis. This decision process through prayer and reflection is rooted in the encounter with Jesus in the sacred Scriptures and the liturgical life of the Church and inspired by openness to the moment of the Holy Spirit which enables us to hear the Spirit speaking to us.

Reading the signs of the times, the Synodality has become a tool in governing the Church in a world hurtfrom the pandemic, extreme weather conditions, massive migration, poverty, violence and moral irrelativeness.

Communion: God gathers us together as diverse people of one faith through the covenant that He offers to His people. The communion we share finds its deepest roots in the love and unity of the Trinity. It is Christ who reconciles us to the Father and unites us in the Holy Spirit. Together we are inspired by listening to the Word of God, through the living tradition of the Church and grounded in the *senses Fidei* (sense of the faith) that we share. We all have a role to play in discerning and living out God's call for His people.



Participation: A call for the involvement of all who belong to the people of God – laity, consecrated and ordained – to be engaged in the exercises, deep and respectful listening to one another. This listening creates space for us to hear the Holy Spirit together and guides our aspirations for the Church of the third millennium. Participation is based on the fact that all the faithful are qualified and are called to serve one another through the gifts they have received from the Holy Spirit.

Mission: The Church exists to evangelize. Our mission is to witness to the love of God amid the whole human family. The Synodal process has a deeply missionary dimension to it. It is intended to enable the Church to better witness the Gospel especially with those who live on the spiritual, social, economic, political, geographical and existential peripheries of our world. In this way Synodality is a part by which the Church can more fully fulfil her mission of evangelization in the world as leaven at the service of the coming of God's Kingdom.

The Seed Grows Up...

To begin on a lighter note... while I was proof reading 'The Seed Grows Up' along with our sisters and by chance if anyone asked me what I was doing, I used to respond, 'The Seed grows up'. Some wondered and asked what it was and I explained saying, it is one of the documents of JMJ Congregation. So next time when they called, the conversation would begin this way: 'What are you doing? Are you reading 'The Seed Grows Up'? God alone knows when your seed will grow up...' And a hearty laugh continued...

While I was going through the fifth Chapter in the Second period i.e.the Papal Approbation of the Constitutions, I thought to pen down a few things and here I am...

These are the four insights that crossed my mind:

1. When the General of Jesuit order was informed about the Papal approbation of the Constitutions, he answered: 'I shall ask God that our good Wolff may catch sheep for many more years and feed them to the greater glory of God.'

I was touched by this metaphor as usually the wolf and sheep share a predator-prey relationship but here Fr. Mathias Wolff looked for young girls to liberate them, to read the signs of the times and to carry the four corners of the world in their hearts, all for the greater glory and honour of God.

- 2. When our Founder began the Society, he had nothing except the dedication and generosity of the three girls and today we are nearly 815 sisters, how much more do we need to be accountable in this world that is moving at a nano speed?
- 3. In this chapter, we also find that due to a stroke on October 31,1857 our 78 years old Founder peacefully passed away. During the memorial service of our sisters, the condolence messages are read out, I was moved while so beautifully it is articulated about our Founder: 'With a pious heart, a brave spirit and strong will, Father Wolff continued at Culemborg to set an example of apostolic zeal by using his talents and strength to the

very best for the salvation of souls, notwithstanding advancing years.' This challenges me to live my consecrated life as I ponder, 'How am I living? Are there any such things that will be said about me?'

4. It is said that prior to the retreat and post retreat preached by Fr. Wolff, the sisters were already filled with spiritual joy, eagerness, and earnest desire for spiritual deepening. There are times that we take two to three days to get into the retreat and by the time we get into the mood of prayer the retreat is over. At times, it seems to me as though before doing the retreat there was one evil spirit prowling around and when the retreat is over as the soul is found clean, a legion of evil spirits prowl around me. But the grace and shield of God protects and strengthens me.

As I went through the Second Volume of the SEED Grows Up, my attention was drawn to the inner prayer life, apostolic zeal, dedication in the mission and great trust in God of our Dutch missionaries. For any seed to grow up there are essential elements necessary such as a healthy seed, good soil, water and sunlight. These four elements are seen in the life of our pioneering sisters who were deeply spiritual, moved with great apostolic zeal, ever ready to adapt to any situation, saying YES to the signs of the times in perfect obedience to the Lord. They believed that when God entrusts a mission, He gives necessary graces to accomplish it and be successful in the mission. They lived simple and holy lives according to the pious maxims of the Founder and handed over to us the same great missionary zeal and the spirit of an ever-adaptable apostolic availability.

Dear Sisters, we are convinced that our Founder never gratified himself, but tried to be everything to everybody in order to win all for Christ. May we too journey with our Founder '*Mon Père*' to radiate the legacy of JMJ here on Earth.

The missionary zeal of our sisters radiated from their happy, peaceful and cheerful hearts. They lived out of love for God and to save as many as souls as possible for God through their total detachment to what is earthly but deeply attached to God alone.

Fr. Wolff said: A sincere sister of JMJ should carry the four corners of the world in her heart and be ready to be sent even to America. Being a missionary is to be sent out anywhere, at any time but not anyhow. It places a demand on us to have the heart of God, to have the mind of God, to have the vision of God, and to have a deep desire to establish the kingdom of God. In this contemporary world, we need to get back to the roots of JMJ and listen to what Fr. Wolff is saying to us again and again. It is our responsibility to imbibe the example of our elderly sisters and live our vocation with faith and courage as true members of the Congregation.

I pray to God, our loving Father, that all of us may truly live our beautiful Charism without any kind of reservations of places, or apostolates but always be ready to go anywhere as obedience requires of us and to carry out with undivided heart the mission that is entrusted to us. May our holy Founder and pioneer sisters intercede for us.May we become the beckons of light of Christ to humanity.



My Life's Journey in JMJ

I was born in a small, remote village called Garlapadu, Guntur Dt., Andhra Pradesh. My father was a Hindu and mother a Catholic. Some years later, my family migrated to my mother's place Phirangipuram. Inspired by my mother's faith, my father accepted the Catholic faith, and became an ardent devotee of Jesus. He was an extraordinary holy man who loved me tenderly being the last child among his seven children. There was no daily



I made my temporary profession in the year 1989. The then Provincial Superior, Rev. Sr. Joanette Mallavarapu sent me for medicine in 1990. Trusting in God's grace, I completed MBBS and later MD - OBG at St John's Medical College, Bangalore. I consider all these events as God's interventions and His providence. Thus, I owe a lot and ever remain grateful to Him.

Mass and no Church in my village, but we kept up the devotions like praying the daily family Rosary that nourished our faith. Rev. Fr. Papaiah Allam, the then Parish Priest of Thalluru visited us once a month by riding a bicycle for an hour to celebrate Mass for us in my house.

At that time there was only one government school up to 5th standard in my village. So, with the assistance of the same priest, I was admitted at St Ann's school in Phirangipuram from 6th to 10th standard. All the girls in my village were married at a very young age. Convincing my parents, I joined at Nallapadu, for PUC with the help of Rev. Fr. Ignatius Yeruva, the then Parish priest. I was from a middle-class family. My parents, brothers and sister were hard working farmers. Their sacrifices motivated me to study hard with responsibility and by God's grace I passed 10th and PUC in first class bringing laurels to my family.

After PUC, I followed a retreat arranged by Rev. Sr. Ignatius Yeruva, the Principal. During that retreat, the words of retreat preacher - "Jesus died for you, what you are going to give Him in return?" inspired me to offer my life to the Lord and I desired to join religious life. This was a turning point in my life. There was a lot of resistance from my parents that I join the religious life; that came from my father's Hindu background. They expected me to take up a job since I was the only girl studied in my village at that time. My parents pleaded me with tears that I stay close to them in their old age. But guided by a mysterious courage and determination, I left home and joined the Society of JMJ.

Earlier in 2003, during the final year of the Post Graduate degree in St. John's, I had a deep God experience. I went through very painful experience when God filled me with His infinite love and healed my whole being with His unconditional forgiveness. His presence filled me with deep peace, joy, serenity, self-confidence, transparency, inner freedom, fearlessness and courage to shoulder any sacrifice for the sake of God. My relationship with everyone transformed into genuine. I was filled with a disposition to forgive, accept, understand and embrace every situation positively. This is where God became very much real and alive to me. Passing final year PG was a miracle and it was absolutely God's grace. I recall having said these words, "Lord, this intimacy of your presence is sufficient for me and I want nothing more than to thank you enough for the rest of my life".

As years passed by, I got engaged in more of work and less of prayer, priority given to people; gradually self-interest crept in. My profession, people and things were taken for granted. Pride and self-image dominated me. Without being aware slowly I fell into the hands of devil and evil was ruling my life. As a result, clashes, misunderstandings, arrogance, self-defiance satisfied my Will. Earlier God was very much alive, but later I experienced dryness in my spiritual life. But all through these years I never lost faith and trust in God. I always believed in His existence, His providential care, Fatherly love and continued to live on my earlier strong God experience.

Since, I could not cope up with an incidence of injustice, I decided to take sabbatical leave for one year, so that

I can in solitude and prayer decide my future life. I am grateful to the Congregation for availing me this beautiful time. During this period, I was confronted with a question - should I return to JMJ? But this thought drove me mad. It squeezed my heart. I went through a lot of agony. I spoke to myself- "For the past 35 years, I considered JMJ as my home, it is better to die than to leave JMJ".

I owe my gratitude to the Corona Pandemic, with lock downs, and house bound restrictions during the sabbatical, I spent more time reading the BIBLE. I could read it with an open mind and heart from the book of Genesis to the Revelation. Once again, I encountered my God alive speaking to me through the Word of God.

The life of Abraham touched me. Deep within me there was an awakening, "Francis, I called you but where are you now?" These words haunted me day and night, I had many sleepless nights. Sincerely, reading and reflecting the Word of God melted my stony heart, humility replaced my pride and there was sincere longing for reconciliation with God and people. I became aware that God uses difficult situations and various people to draw me closer to Him. I could forgive

and sincerely thank them who hurt me. It is because of them I could take a sabbatical; I could encounter my God and regain my relationship with Him. Making up my mind to withstand – what come may, ready to face any challenges and untoward situations, placing my total trust in God, surrendering rest of my life in His hands, I returned to JMJ believing that God is my ultimate Goal.

At the completion of staying nine months in St. Xavier's Ongole, following covid vaccination I was infected with corona, psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis. This crippled and made me dependent on others even for my personal needs. By God's grace, I could accept this sickness also as part of my purification.

God worked a miracle. He healed me completely through the intercession of Mother Mary. I am able to carry on the God

given mission. I offer honor and glory to God Almighty. I am grateful to all the people who prayed for my health and vocation. Special thanks and my humble prayers to Superior General Rev. Sr. Innamma Yeruva, the Provincial Superior Sr. Anthony Mary, all the sisters,

fathers and my family members for your sacrifices, prayers, moral support and timely guidance.

Along with me, many of our JMJ sisters prayed to Rev. Dr. Sr. Mary Glowrey for her prayers to save my vocation and for healing. Through her intersession and along with Mother Mary, I believe God has healed me and brought me back to serve the needy people of God.

As I glance at the past, I am grateful to God; as I look into the future, I surrender my life into His hands; and as I live now, I totally trust and believe that His grace is sufficient in all my limitations. I pray "Lord! You may take all that you have given me, my talents, profession, comforts, friends and even my health but give me heaven

at the end. Amen." YES, if I lose heaven, the entire purpose of life is lost and I will be lost forever.

Finally, I affirm myself:

Francis!
Life is very short and it is temporary
Give yourself totally to the Lord
Give it generously in His service
Don't count the cost
Trust Him at all times
Surrender everything into God's hands
He will never leave you alone
He is always faithful
You are under
His loving protection. AMEN





Sr. Wenceslaus a Gem of Great Value

Let me not defer nor neglect, for I shall not pass this way again." This is the core motive of Sr. Wenceslaus all through her life. She does her best, to everyone whom she meets, without any preference, even to the plants in the garden. At the age of 85 she is the JPIC promotor for Preethinivas Community, Bangalore.

A gem cannot be polished without friction, nor can a person be perfected without trials. So also, Sister Wency has faced life's trials and temptations with undeterred courage and indomitable spirit. Born as the 5th child among 7 children she was loved by her parents greatly. Her younger sister is fond of Sr. Wency, in fact they are like '*one stem with two flowers*' and both wanted to join religious life but only Sr. Wency was chosen by God.

Since her childhood, she had a desire to embrace religious life and she kept her vision and dream alive trusting in God's providence. Sister joined JMJ on 23rd May 1960 at Guntur along with Sr. Dionysia. She made her temporary profession in 1965 and then her perpetual commitment in 1970. Recognizing her talent for good communication,

she was sent for teacher's training. She is not only a teacher to the students but a loving mother, she always had special care for the weak and poor students.

For Sr. Wency, work is worship. In the morning, afternoon, and evening, always she is on her legs in the garden but still never tired and remains cheerful. Her life is very inspiring. She is obedient to the religious authorities throughout her life. A teacher by profession, she worked as co-novice directress and warden. In whichever community she was, she made the sisters happy by preparing special dishes. She remains happy and contended, never complains but always compliments on the beauty and service rendered by each individual.

She is a praying and discerning person. Every day, she spends at least 3 to 4 hours before the Blessed Sacrament, reads spiritual books, draws inspiration from the lives of saints and shares her knowledge with others. She is very simple, hospitable and God-fearing person. Prayer and fasting are her constant companions.

This episode reveals her love and relationship with the plants. In the Novitiate we had a Tree called, *Battakai*, which was not yielding fruit although well taken care, so she used to go to the tree daily and say, 'If you don't yield fruit, I will cut youdown.' To everyone's surprise, it bore lots of fruits the following year. In life too she proved herself as a precious gift to God by blooming wherever she is planted.

A single encounter with Sr. Wency inspires you and challenges you. In spite of her age and aches, we see her moving graciously among the plants, conveying message of love with her loving look and gentle touch. She receives everyone who comes to the provincialate community with a tender smile and affectionate wish. We just wonder how could she be so serene always!

While having a little chat with her, when I asked, how she feels about her life at this age, she strongly and spontaneously answered - 'My God has offered me all that I want, hence I have no regrets and am quite happy.' She never asks for comforts and never speaks of another person. She is quite happy and contended in life.

God has planted a person like Sr. Wency in the Society of JMJ with a divine taste for prayer and deep devotion to her work. Her advice to the young members is to possess a deep love for the Lord and our Congregation, fidelity to our way of life and prayer, regularity and punctuality in our religious activities, courage to achieve impossible things and be an inspiration and role model to everyone to walk in the footsteps of Jesus. Sr. Wency is so loved and admired by all and truly she is a gem of great value!



Validating my Vocation to Religious Life

The candidates came from home with all the fears and uncertainties of their future, they had to learn to adjust with new companions, different cultures and languages. They ought to learn English, a language which they find difficult, learn prayers, about the Congregation and so many other things. They were altogether in a different world; hence I could not expect much perfection. They were not able live according to my expectation. At the

same time, I realized that vocation is a gift of God, like a seed planted in each one's heart, which symbolizes the soil. Formator is a caretaker, who takes the responsibility to make the seed to grow. It needs water, air and all that is needed to germinate and grow. In other words, the candidates need love, care, concern and understanding and recognition of their uniqueness.

The formators must offer themselves totally to God and to the formees. I learned to be patient, tolerant and see the needs of the candidate. They look for a role model. They learn from what we do, not what we say. In words of Fr.Wolff, we need to help the formees to appreciate and validate their vocation to religious life. It was a great challenge for me to foster their vocation, create a homely atmosphere, and to incultate in them love and loyalty.

In conclusion, I wish to say that a formator is one who walks with the formees hand in hand and shows the way of God. Today, I acknowledge the great works of God that many young girls were inspired and followed the path of Christ by embracing the JMJ Spirituality and Charism. Let us keep praying to the Lord of the harvest to send many more young girls to our Congregation to continue His mission. Reminiscing Memories of My Journey to Ghana - Land of Gold

This intervention helped us to draw out the strengths and the opportunities for JMJ sisters in mission and interventions needed for the effective functioning of the mission in Ghana Region.

This journey has recharged my personal life and my professional life as well. It was a great opportunity for me to understand and learn the culture that helped me greatly to interact with different groups of children, youth, men and women from different neighbourhoods. It's amazing to see their simple life style, pleasant and hospitable approach, open-hearted and generous welcome with Guineafowls, chilis and beans. People's responsibility towards the wellbeing of their families and their respect towards traditional leaders and the edlerly in the community is astonishing. My daily encounters with our sisters and unique experiences impressed me so much, and helped me to immerse myself easily into the culture. It was only then that I began to see the true beauty of Ghana which I keep cherishing all along my journey in religious life.

I thank the Almighty God for this rare privilege bestowed on me. My sincere gratitude to Sr. Innamma Yeruva and General Council Team, Sr. Sundari Singareddy and Council for giving me this great opportunity to visit and assess the mission needs of JMJ in Ghana Region.
