With great joy and anticipation, I journeyed to Kodaikanal to attend the Roots and Wings 2025 program. I was deeply touched by the scenic beauty of the place - its forested valleys, serene lakes, cascading waterfalls, grassy hills, and the unique star-shaped lake bordered by evergreen forests. The location radiated the exquisite touch of the Creator, filled with divine presence. Amidst the coolness of the external climate, we the participants felt an inner warmth - a deep yearning to learn and grow in the richness of Ignatian spirituality.



Roots and Wings is a program organized by the Secretariat of Faith, Jesuit Conference of South Asia, offering participants an in-depth understanding of Ignatian Spirituality. The group was a beautiful blend of seasoned Jesuit fathers, scholarly mentors, enthusiastic young Jesuits, and we six sisters. Much credit goes to Fr. Devadhas Muthiah SJ and Fr. Augustine John Peter SJ, whose meticulous planning ensured our stay, both enriching and comfortable.

The first module, led by Fr. William Sequeira SJ, focused on the Autobiography of St. Ignatius. Revisiting the life and conversion of St. Ignatius set the tone for the subsequent modules in a very meaningful way. Fr. Pavulraj Michael SJ then guided us through the Spiritual Exercises, helping us to experience intimate encounters with God. He emphasized that the primary goal of the Exercises is to help retreatants break free from disordered attachments and move towards a life of service and purpose.

Fr. Arul Sivan SJ introduced us to the Constitutions, highlighting that they are more than just rules-they reflect the mind and spirit of St. Ignatius, guiding us to live in a way that is pleasing to God. Fr. Francis Pudhicherry SJ shared insights from the Spiritual Diary and Letters of St. Ignatius, which invited us into a deeper understanding of his spiritual journey and legacy.

The month-long Ignatian journey culminated in a pilgrimage and retreat. We visited St. John de Britto's martyrdom site in Oriyur, Sivagangai Diocese-a powerful experience embodying Ignatian courage and sacrifice. The words of Matthew 16:25, *“Whoever loses their life for my sake will find it,”* resonated deeply with us. The final eight-day retreat, directed by Fr. Irudayaraj Manickam SJ, allowed us to internalize all we had experienced through silent meditation and reflection, deepening our awareness of *finding God in all things*.

The Roots and Wings course was truly a precious opportunity to pause, reflect, and grow-both personally and spiritually. True to its name, the course helped me reconnect with the roots of my congregation-the foundation of my vocation, my values, and the essence of community life - while strengthening my wings to face the future with renewed energy, hope, and inner freedom.

A significant source of the program’s richness was the diversity of participants. Each person brought unique experiences, insights, and inspirations. We journeyed together as companions, creating an atmosphere of trust, encouragement, and shared learning.

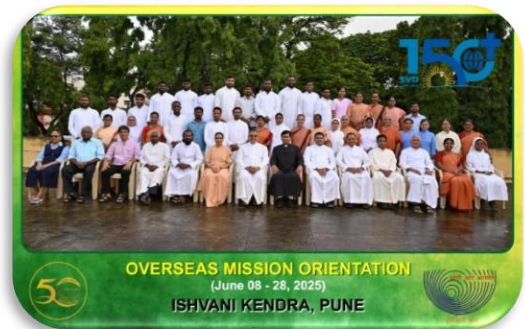
Life is a Mission **Born for Mission – A Journey of the Heart**

Pilgrims of Hope

“Give Thanks to the Lord for He is good, His love endures forever.”

The long-awaited day had dawned on 7th May to commence our pilgrimage to the birth place of our Congregation and to the Eternal city Rome. As pilgrims of Hope, it was an exciting experience the moment we got into the flight; our joy was beyond an expression. We could feel the love, care and protection of The Almighty all through our journey.



We would like to give you a glimpse of the places that we visited in a nutshell from the day 7th May to 18th May 2025.

08.05.25 Culemborg: The historical town of Culemborg is known for its religious diversity and is called “The gateway to the Betuwe.” It is here our founder lived and rendered his services as a loyal priest. We were fortunate to have Eucharistic celebration in Culemborg church presided over by the Auxiliary Bishop Ted. We were drawn towards the picture SEAT OF MERCY which is preserved as a treasure of the past. Visiting the St. Augustine archives, we were spellbound by the writings of our founder and our sisters with their own hand writing and artistically maintained the records.

Nijmegen: This city has a deep Christian root. Here our founder was appointed as a parish priest from 1824 - 1846. As we walked in the footsteps of our founder, we cherished and relished each moment with immense spiritual joy. We also visited the chapel of our Lady of Nijmegen who was known as Mother of Invalids. Here our founder used to pray and brought healing to the body of a cripple miraculously. It was a profound experience especially into the spirituality of our founder.

May 9-05-2025: Visit to the Founder’s Grave – Reflection:

We gathered solemnly at the entrance of the graveyard, carrying candles and flower pots, as a gesture of remembrance for our founder, Matthias Wolf. The procession led us to his grave, where a heartfelt prayer service was conducted by Sr. Anitha. The experience deeply inspired us to rekindle the spirit of our founder and embraced our identity as his true daughters. Surrounding his grave was the resting places of our Dutch sisters, dating back to the 18th century - a powerful testament to our congregation's enduring legacy. In that sacred moment near our founder's grave, we felt a renewed sense of purpose and unity, holding the prayerful presence of all our P.P. sisters in our hearts.



Met Dutch Sisters at Abdijstraat: There were 30 elderly Dutch Sisters live in a community and Sr. Lilian is the regional superior. We were welcomed by them and few of our sisters honoured them all with a shawl, badge and gifts. They were excited to meet us. We had tea with them and spent some time with them. We visited Marienburg Chapel, where the mission started and from where the sisters were sent to Indonesia and India as missionaries. This building was sold to Government, and it is used as a university. In the chapel of Marienburg, which is no more chapel but we had a candle procession and placed candles in the name JMJ and had a meaningful prayer service led by Sisters Lilly and Anitha. We felt a peaceful atmosphere and the power of God within us.

10-5-25 Tulip flower Garden: The place is called LISSE. We had a trip to Tulip Garden, so beautiful, fantastic and marvellous. We can't imagine the variety of flowers and beauty of God's creation for the happiness of man. We were so excited and thrilled to see the different flowers which we can't find in India. Yes, we were fortunate to have this precious opportunity to witness the beautiful and wonderful Tulip flower garden.

Canal Cruise: A pleasant ride taking round the canal to see the beauty of Amsterdam with huge buildings and how it developed into a wonderful city as the years passed.

11-5-25 Lourdes: The new day was dawn to visit the place of Lourdes. On many of us were longing and waiting to see Mother Mary at Grotto, to seek her blessings. We arrived at Lourdes only at 4:30 PM. Then we proceeded to join the candle procession along with the people.



12-5-25: Another wonderful day began with a Holy Mass at 8:30 AM by a Dominican priest from India in the chapel of St. Maximilian. Thereafter a guide was arranged to explain the details about Lourdes to be visited. Then he took us to Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto, St. Bernadette's burial site, the hill and Eucharistic Adoration Basilica. This is underground where the Adoration takes place every day from 5 PM to 6:30 PM. During this adoration, many people experienced the healing of

their infirmities. Later we visited Sacred Heart church where St. Bernadette was baptized. From there we proceeded to the house of St. Bernadette where she was born.

Miraculous spring water: Dipping the persons in the miraculous water was practiced for healing. From 2020 covid onwards, dipping was not done but water given to wash.

Lourdes - A Night of Grace and Healing: After dinner, we joined the candlelight procession at 9:00 PM. We were blessed to stand just behind the statue of Our Lady. The atmosphere was deeply spiritual, with many of our sisters holding the flags of India and Lourdes, praying the Rosary, and singing devotional songs. As we reached the church, a final prayer was said, and all of us were blessed. Many of us experienced the healing power of Mother Mary - both spiritually and physically. The grace of Lourdes touched our hearts deeply. The next day, we departed to the airport, carrying these sacred memories with us.

13-05-2023 - Arrival in Rome: The Eternal City:

We arrived in Rome at 4:30 PM and were warmly welcomed at the airport by our Mother General, Sr. Mary. A grand reception awaited us at the Generalate, complete with garlands and a traditional Aarthi for 56 of us. After dinner, we retired for the night, filled with anticipation for the days ahead.

14-05-2023 - A Special Day at St. Peter's Basilica: Our day began early, at 7:30 AM, with a visit to St. Peter's Basilica. A spacious hall had been beautifully arranged with chairs for a private Papal audience. At 10:45 AM, we were honoured by the arrival of Pope Leo XIV. He delivered a heartfelt message encouraging universal detachment, prayer, sacrifice, and goodness. As he concluded, he waved his hands in blessing and returned to his office at the centre of the hall. We were deeply moved and spiritually uplifted by this once-in-a-lifetime encounter. We were very privileged persons to have the glimpse of Pope Leo XIV.

Then we proceeded to the four major Basilicas namely St. Peter's Basilica, St. Paul, St. John Lateran, and Mary Major Basilica. After that, we went to the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica in prayer, and we prayed for all the intentions of the Church, the world, the Congregation, and our families. Later we did some shopping and returned to the Generalate.

15-5-25 Catacomb Ian Place:

Only 25 sisters went to this place since it was underground. They were so impressed by seeing this place where the early Christians stood their bold faith. They came back by lunchtime and we all had lunch together. After that, we proceeded to Monte scenario community as it was an occasion of Silver Jubilee of the convent and Sr. Sarojini of her Religious life. We had a meaningful Eucharistic celebration and followed by felicitation and dinner.

Date: 17-05-2025: Assisi Experience:

We visited the resting place of Blessed Carlo Acutis, who is soon to be canonized. His incorrupt body and the miracles attributed to him deeply moved us. A great devotee of the Eucharist, his life inspired us to cultivate a stronger devotion to the Eucharistic Lord and commit more faithfully to our religious life. We attended Holy Mass at 6:00 p.m. in one of the chapels in Assisi and returned to our guesthouse by 9:40 p.m.

Mary Major Basilica, Rome: Entering through the Holy Door, we sought God's blessings and participated in the sacrament of confession. The Holy Mass was a profound experience where we felt God's mercy and received abundant personal blessings. We also paid homage to the late Pope Francis, buried in the Basilica. The place was filled with thousands of pilgrims, especially during this Jubilee Year 2025.

Church of Mary of Revelation: We visited the Church where Our Lady appeared to a farmer and asked for a church to be built in her honour. It was a spiritually enriching experience that reminded us of Mary's presence and guidance.

Basilica of St. Paul: At the Basilica of St. Paul, we reflected on the life and martyrdom of St. Paul. He was beheaded here, and tradition holds that his head rolled three times. Before his execution, he was held in a cell. The site left a deep impression on all of us as we contemplated his faith and sacrifice.

Summary: 18-05-2025: The day began with a meaningful Sunday Mass at St. Joseph's Church, followed by breakfast at the Founders' House and a return to the Generalate. Some sisters visited the local market before rejoining for lunch. In the afternoon, a group evaluation took place at 2:45 PM, opened with a prayer by Mother General. She shared words of appreciation and invited the sisters to reflect on their experiences from the trip. Several sisters expressed how deeply enriched and inspired they were by visiting the holy places, emphasizing the importance of becoming channels of faith, hope, and love in their missions. These reflections were followed by group sharing and a gift presentation to the Mother General and her council.



It was a heartfelt close to a spiritually uplifting journey - an Expression of Gratitude and Reflection on the Pilgrimage of Hope.

We, the sisters of the province, sang the song of gratitude and appreciation to our sisters, General and Council, as well as our Province for accompanying us from the 7th to 19th of May on this blessed Pilgrimage of Hope. It was truly a meaningful and fruitful experience. We are happy to share that we all reached our homes safely on the 20th of May 2025 at 8:20 AM.

With grateful hearts, we extend our sincere thanks to our Mother General and Council, and to our Provincial and Council, for this golden and unforgettable opportunity given to 13 of us. It was a time to experience and enrich ourselves spiritually. We carry with us the hope and prayer that we may become a bond of hope to all those whom we meet in our lives. Finally, we thank God for His constant care and protection that we experienced throughout this journey. May the good and great God be praised forever and ever. Amen.

Our Retreat Experience: Renewing our Relationship with God

“We have held many things in our hands and lost them all. But whatever we have placed in God’s hands, we still possess.” These words capture perfectly what our one-month retreat meant to us - a sacred time of letting go, of rediscovering what truly matters and of allowing God to renew our tired hearts.

With deep gratitude, we thank God for this transformative experience, guided by Fr. Leofern S.J. It was not merely a time of prayer and silence but a personal journey, a time when we encountered God in a way we never had before. We came with many burdens, questions and distractions, but God met us with love, patience and gentleness. We experienced His unconditional acceptance and the quiet assurance that we are loved, not for what we do, but simply because we are His children.

Each day of the retreat became an invitation to listen more deeply to the Word of God, to our hearts and to the still voice of the Spirit speaking within us. In the silence, we found clarity. In the Scriptures, we found direction. And in prayer, we found the loving presence of God waiting for us with open arms.

First Week - Invitation from Yahweh:

The first week was a time of awakening. The theme “Invitation from Yahweh” became very personal for us. Like Abraham and Moses, we felt uncertain about where God was leading us, but we also knew that saying yes to Him is the beginning of real freedom. This week helped us to rediscover the beauty of surrender of trusting God even when the path is unclear.

Second Week - Contemplation on the Kingdom of Jesus Christ:

In the second week, we were drawn to reflect on the Kingdom of Jesus Christ a kingdom not of power or wealth but of love, compassion, and service. As we prayed and meditated on the life of Jesus, we began to see how much His Kingdom contrasts with the world’s idea of success. Through the Gospel stories, we felt ourselves walking beside Jesus at the lake where He called His first disciples, at the table where He ate with sinners, and even at the Cross where He gave His life in love. These contemplations touched us deeply. We



realized that to belong to Christ's Kingdom means to follow His way of humility and mercy. We also understood that Jesus doesn't just invite me to admire Him; He calls us to imitate Him. We began to ask ourselves, Are we living as a true disciple? Do we reflect the love and forgiveness of Christ in my words and actions? These questions challenged us, but they also gave us new purpose. We understood that our relationship with God cannot be real if it doesn't move us to love others.

Third Week - Love in Abundance:

By the third week, we had come face to face with the overwhelming reality of God's love, a love that is patient, forgiving, and unconditional. This was a week of deep healing for us. We allowed ourselves to stand before God, just as we are with our weaknesses, wounds and failures and we experienced His embrace of mercy.

The words that kept coming to our heart were: "Christ without the Cross is not realistic, and the Cross without Christ is not redemptive." We began to see that our own crosses, our struggles and losses were not signs of punishment but an invitation to love Him more deeply. We realized that God gives us burdens not to break us but to strengthen us, and along with every burden, He gives us shoulders to carry it. In this week, we experienced what it means to be truly loved by God. His love was not distant or abstract; it was personal and alive. We learned to forgive ourselves, to forgive others and to let go of what was holding us back from experiencing peace. We felt lighter, freer and more open to life. We understood that love in abundance is not something we have to earn it is something already given, waiting for us to receive.

Fourth Week - Rejoice, the Lord is Risen:

The final week of the retreat filled our hearts with joy. "Rejoice, the Lord is Risen!" these words came alive for us in a new way. After walking through silence, surrender, and healing, we experienced the joy of resurrection not only Christ's, but also our own inner resurrection. We realized that renewal is not only about letting go of sin or sorrow; it is also about embracing life again with hope. The Risen Lord reminded us that no darkness is permanent, no wound is beyond healing and no sin is greater than His mercy. This realization gave us courage to face life with new faith. We also felt a deep desire to share this joy with others. The retreat was not something to keep to ourselves; it was a call to be a witness of God's love to live differently, with more patience, kindness and gratitude.

My Gratitude and Renewal:

As we look back now, we see the retreat as a gift beyond measure. The daily Eucharist, the meditation, the personal guidance and especially the silence all became channels of grace for us.



We came to the retreat searching for peace, and we left with a renewed heart and a deeper friendship with God. We learned that our life has meaning only when it is rooted in Christ. Without Him, everything loses its direction; but with Him, even our struggles find purpose. We now understand that surrendering to God is not losing control, it is finding freedom.

The retreat has renewed our relationship with God in a way we cannot express fully. It taught us that we don't need to hold everything in our own hands. When we place our life, our dreams and our fears in God's hands, we lose nothing we gain everything.

As we return to our daily lives, we carry within us a quiet strength, a hope that comes from knowing that God is with us in all things. We want to live each day with gratitude, trusting that He will continue to guide us, shape us and love us just as He did during those sacred days of retreat.

The Rich experience from village visits- struggles and progress of rural communities

We sincerely thank Sr. Thresiamma, the Provincial and Sr. Ruby for giving us the opportunity to experience this special moment. We are deeply grateful to Fr. Siju Varghese and the community for their warm welcome that made us feel at home. We are blessed to be among the people with whom our sisters Lourdu Mary and Swetha are joyfully collaborating in God’s mission. May this spirit of togetherness and dedication continue to inspire us all in our journey of faith and service. As we journeyed, we experienced deeply that one step can lead to many changes.



During our visit to Ahmednagar, Maharashtra, we had the privilege of witnessing the mission collaboration between our sisters and the Jesuit Fathers. The Jesuits here have been engaged in a remarkable social mission, reaching out to people in the peripheries and rural areas, addressing their struggles, and walking with them in their challenges. One of the pioneering initiatives of

this mission was taken up by Fr. Herman Becker from Switzerland, who in 1966, retched pressing issue of drought in this region. With foresight and deep compassion, he launched a project to conserve and safeguard water resources. What began as a humble initiative has now grown into a widespread and impactful movement, helping countless villages to sustain themselves through water conservation, watershed management, and awareness programs. This project continues to be a lifeline for many families even today.



As part of this mission experience, we visited Karanji, a place recently affected by a devastating cloudburst. Walking through the village, we saw the damage it had caused and met the people who were directly impacted. Listening to their stories and encountering their resilience left a deep impression on us. Despite their struggles, the strength and hope of the villagers were evident, and it reminded us of the importance of solidarity and accompaniment in times of crisis

This visit not only opened our eyes to the challenges of rural communities but also deepened our appreciation for the long-standing commitment of the Jesuit mission in Ahmednagar. Their work is a living witness of faith in action transforming lives, restoring dignity, and bringing hope where it is most needed.

Education and Harvesting On the third day, our focus was on education and watershed management. We visited villages where people had worked collectively to conserve water and make their land fertile. The villagers explained how these efforts transformed barren areas into green fields, securing food and water for their families throughout the year. What touched us most was their emphasis on education, children who once struggled due to poor facilities now had better opportunities through the community's initiatives. During our conversations, the locals shared how a social centre was started in their area to guide them in sustainable farming and provided support during tough times. Listening to their stories, we felt inspired by how collective effort can bring about real change. They spoke warmly with us, as if we were part of their own village, which made the experience even more personal and memorable.

Empowered Women and Self-Help Groups. The fourth day was dedicated to meeting women from self-help groups. These women had truly changed the rhythm of their lives. Many of them had taken interest-free loans and started small but impactful businesses. Some ran tea stalls, while

others sold dairy products like lassi, milk, and paneer. A group of women had even organized themselves to prepare chapattis for hotel supply, making up to a hundred chapattis daily. Talking with them was both humbling and inspiring. They spoke about the challenges they faced in the



beginning and how, with mutual support, they built confidence and independence. We were deeply moved to see their courage and determination. Each woman we met carried a sense of dignity and pride in being able to support her family. What stood out even more was their generosity- despite their busy lives, they welcomed us wholeheartedly, laughed with us, and shared their experiences openly, as if we had known them for years. Hospitality, Gratitude and the warmth of the people stayed with us. Families provided us with freshly cooked meals, prepared from crops harvested in their own fields. Sharing their food felt like sharing their lives - it was an act of love and hospitality that won our hearts. As we left, what remained with us was not just knowledge of watershed management or self-help groups, but the spirit of community, resilience, and generosity. Seeing how education, cooperation, and empowerment transformed their lives filled us with hope and admiration.

The Future of Robotics

The world is standing on the edge of a new era- one shaped by the growing power and intelligence of robots.
